

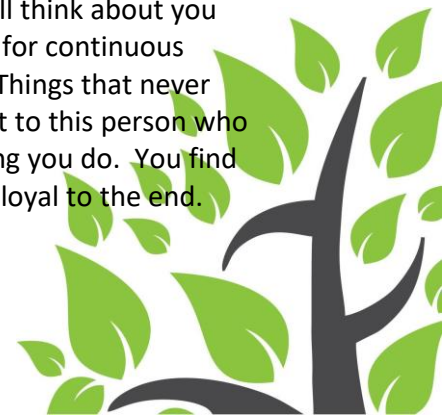
## Readings

**Marriage is Madness, Unknown Author**

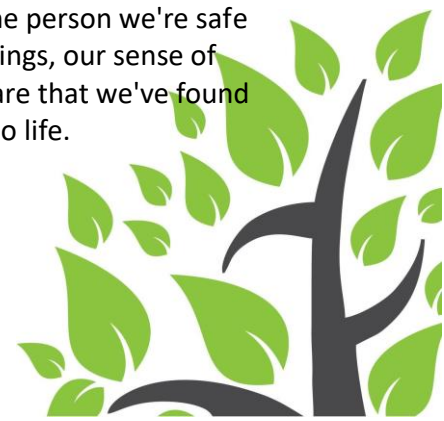

**From Life's Little Instruction Book, by H. Jackson Brown Jr.**

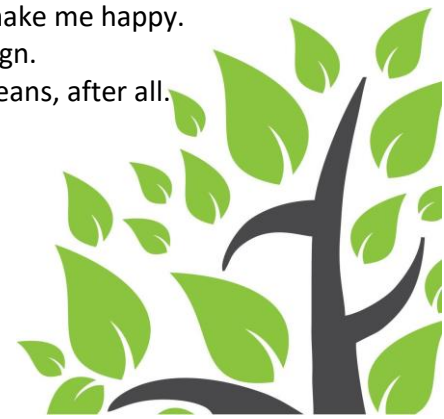

**I Do, Unknown Author**

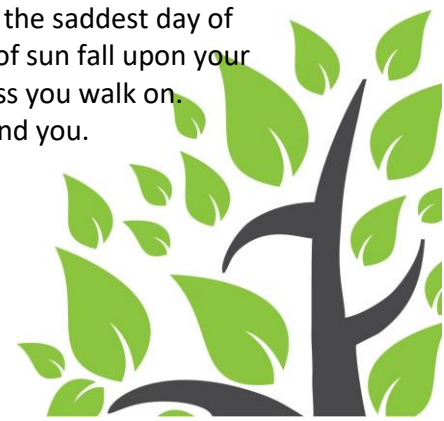

**To Love, Unknown Author**

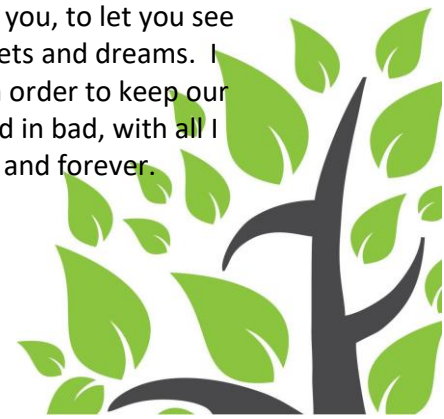
