What is FTP?

✓ File Transfer Protocol (FTP) is a standard network protocol used to transfer files from one host to another host over a TCP-based network, such as the Internet.



What is FTP?

√ Basically: it's like Apple's Finder or Window's explorer to help you navigate to your server



Security

✓ FTP was not designed to be a secure protocol—especially by today's standards—and has many security weaknesses.



Security

- √ Different types of connections
 - √ FTP no data encryption
 - √ FTPS allows clients to request encrypted session
 - ✓ SFTP SSH FTP
 - √ FTP over SSH refers to the practice of tunneling over SSH



✓ Here's the root directory for a WordPress installation






WordPress File Structure


Inside wp-content

Index of /wp-content

- Parent Directory
- index .php
- plugins/
- themes/
- upgrade/
- uploads/
