TRAINING We are so proud to announce the end of our first fully fledged STEP programme (Skills and Technical Education Programme) <u>www.stepmw.com</u>, sponsored by the EU. Over the past four months we have trained up 48 young adults from marginalised backgrounds such as ultra-poor, single parents, orphan, with a disability, HIV+. They have been trained in Basic Electronics, Carpentry and Tailoring. They have their graduation on 7th December, where they will also receive their Start-up pack to help them set up in business. The UNESCO funding we received has allowed us to provide these bursary holders with all the appropriate materials and training to set them on the road to a profitable future and self-sufficiency.

We provided our tailors who graduated at the end of July, with their Start-up packs and we are now following them to see how they are getting on in business. Florida Lefani (top left) was visited in her home village of M'bang'ombe where she lives with her grandmother and siblings. She is now earning an average of 10,000 MWK (£11) per week which is incredible and the first thing she used her money for, was to pay for her brothers school fees! She is on the road to self-sufficiency! As part of our contract after they graduate, they willingly agree to support our organisation. When required, our tailors will be making uniforms for orphan and vulnerable children at half labour costs. This helps everyone and is a way of paying back for the free training they received.

HEALTH

Life in the villages can be challenging enough, but if you have a disability or health issue, it becomes even more of a challenge. Julie Ndalama our Disability Outreach Worker does an amazing job in supporting some of the most vulnerable people in our area. We have a strong partnership with 500 Miles who provide orthotics and prosthetic limbs to help people become independent. Jennifer (below right) walks independently to school and plays with her friends since having her prosthetic limb fitted 3 years ago. As she grows a new one is made by 500 Miles. Chikondi (right) has to walk 2km to school on his stumps now his wheelchair is broken. We want to get him a tricycle which costs £200 to help make him have an independent and easier life getting to school. Dixson (below) was picked up with a badly infected leg. He didn't have enough money to go to hospital! We took him and he was operated on, and within 2 weeks he has been discharged back home! £50 saved his life!

EDUCATION

We have 15 new Secondary School scholarships this year starting in Form 1 and thanks to LSU for sponsoring an additional 5 female students. We have one Secondary school student still looking for sponsorship @ £25 per month. We have 16 University students and a further 4 on our waiting list who need sponsorship of £85 per month. Wezie Gwaluka, our Education Manager, visited all our students with LSU in October. Steward Pointani (above) a University students is doing his teaching practice at Madizi School so he is now teaching some of our students!

In August we gave Phonics training to 10 Primary Schools using the CharChar chest resources. These schools are now being monitored for increased levels of literacy. Chris came over from Canada to install 3 laptops in our Library ; we have 100 E-books now available. Wezie did a follow up training session with the CBCC Caregivers and helped them do their termly planning to teach the under 5's. (all below). Kambulire Junior School is a very poor Government school built by the community with 400 pupils learning in a class with a blown off roof (below). We are looking for a UK partnership school that can help support this school.

VOLUNTEERS— Jo and Colin Benefield came to visit their partnership school, Chikuyakuti, in October. They stayed in a teacher's house which their school, Christ Church in Surbiton, had funded. The 3 days were an amazing eye opener to them. They generously funded getting Chikondi (below) a tricycle. He is one of our carpentry trainees at Sam's Village.

Abigail Phiri is doing a 3 month internship with us at Sam's Village where she has supported the trainees and held interviews. She is currently following up the graduated tailors in their villages and holding interviews.

Our volunteer LBC (Local Based Committees) Cluster meeting was held in November and focused on our new recruitment for next trainees at Sam's Village and Jeruzye held training on setting up a Village Savings & Loans (VSL) as an income generating project for them.

We picked up Anesse who was 8 months pregnant (due on Christmas day) with chronic mastitis and took her to hospital. Because of being pregnant they wanted to wait until after the birth to do treatment. She gave birth early, but tragically there was a twist to the tale as she was found riddled with cancer of the womb and taken to High Dependency in Kamuzu Central Hospital, where she died 3 days after giving birth. Her little daughter is fine and being kept in hospital to be fed. We will buy her formula milk so the grandmother can support her and she has 3 other young brothers and sisters that also need supporting.
