Joel 1 Teaching Points and Bible Study Questions

The Power of God's Word

The book of Joel opens with a call to hear the word of the Lord: "Hear this, you elders; listen, all who live in the land" (Joel 1:2). This reminds us of the importance of being attentive to God's voice in our lives. Just as the elders were called to listen, we too should prioritize Scripture as our ultimate guide and authority.

1. How can you apply the urgency of God's message in Joel 1 to your daily life decisions?
