(Wilcox) and Holloway W.,* was born at Naples, Scott County, Illinois, December 22, 1842, where he resided until 1855, when he removed with his parents to Morgan City, Ills.; and from thence to a farm near Sparta, Ills., where he had the benefit of a common school and the Sparta Academy. He attended the Law Department of the University of Michigan. In the early part of the civil war, his brother, George W., (then a lad of sixteen years) enlisted in Co. I, 49th Reg't Illinois Volunteers, and when his brother was sick, he took his place, did his duty, answered to his name, thus doing military duty in that way in Kentucky and Tennessee for two years. He graduated from the University of Michigan, March 28, 1866, receiving the degree of LL. B. He
