God's Two Greatest Commands

'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' The second is like it, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments depend the whole Law and the Prophets."
Matthew 22:39-40

A. To Love God First (Matt. 22:38-40; Eph. 3:17-19)

Being rooted and grounded in love . . . and to know the love of Christ which surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled up to all the fullness of God. Eph. 3:17

Reflect: *Are you filled up to all the fullness of God? Is His love flowing into you, and overflowing into the lives of others? Or have you been drinking at broken cisterns?*

B. To Love Your Neighbor

1. Love Yourself – See YOUR part in God’s story
 - A love without fear (1 John 4:18)
 - An honest evaluation (Rom. 12:3)
- a. Understand fully your identity in Christ (Gen. 1:26; 1 John 3:2; 1 Pet. 2:9)
- b. Get a good grasp of your callings and boundaries (Eph. 4:1)
- c. Understand your gifts, steward them well (Matt. 25; Eccl. 9:10)

He who is faithful in a very little thing is faithful also in much. Luke 16:10

- d. Learn to cultivate a grateful heart

2. Love your neighbor – see THEIR part in God’s story
a. As you love yourself (Matt. 22:39-40) → p. 2

In everything, therefore, treat people the same way you want them to treat you . . . Matt. 7:12

- b. As God has loved you (John 13:34-35)

Reflect: *How do you respond to people you meet every day? Are you able to see your own worth as well as others in being an image bearer of God? In the callings and giftings God the Creator has entrusted to you and them?*

God’s Heart for His Church

A. God LOVES the church (Eph. 5:25-29)

. . . for no one ever hated his own flesh, but nourishes and cherishes it, just as Christ also does the church.

Reflect: *Do you love the church? Do you count yourself as one of the beloved?*

B. The unity of the church showcases the Gospel

. . . that they may be perfected in unity, so that the world may know that You sent Me, and loved them, even as You have loved Me. John 17:20-23

Reflect: *Do you have a strained relationship at church? Does anyone have a bad impression of the church because of what you have done or said?*

C. The church is Christ's Body (Eph. 4:12-16; Rom. 12:10)

And if the ear says, "Because I am not an eye, I am not a part of the body," it is not for this reason any the less a part of the body. . . . And the eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you"; or again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." 1 Cor. 12:14-25

Troubleshooting

- **Conflict, envy, irritation** → p. 2 (James 4:1-2; 1 Pet. 1:22; 3:9; Rom. 15:7)

Since you have in obedience to the truth purified your souls for a sincere love of the brethren, fervently love one another from the heart. 1 Peter 1:22

Not returning evil for evil or insult for insult, but giving a blessing instead. 1 Pet. 3:9

Therefore, accept one another, just as Christ also accepted us to the glory of God. Rom. 15:7

- **Be all things to all people** (Phil. 2:7; Rom. 15:1-3)

Troubleshooting

- **Besties** (Prov. 17:17; 18:24)

“Your family and closest friends have greater access to your life, plenty of one-on-one time with you in private, so why should they also have all your public time? They can talk to you later. One friend and I have made a pact that when we find ourselves gravitating toward each other, one of us will announce, ‘Come on! Let’s go touch some sheep!’” Elizabeth George

- **Loneliness** (Psalm 25:16; Isa. 53:3)

“Because Jesus is our friend, we no longer walk into a room alone and in need of friendship. He is with us! We are liberated to be a companion to someone else, rather than seeking one out for ourselves. We are freed to be the most interested person in the room, not the most interesting . . . You don’t have to be an extroverted, life-of-the-party type of person to apply this. It simply means that you are willing to greet others rather than waiting to be greeted. It means choosing to ask about their lives rather than looking for ways to share about yours. Good friends initiate conversations, ask questions, and listen well.”

- **Redemptive Speech** (Eph. 4:15; 1 Thess. 5:11)

Therefore encourage one another and build up one another, just as you also are doing. 1 Thess. 5:11

But speaking the truth in love . . . Eph. 4:15

Reflect: *Do you see yourself as an integral part of the church body? Does someone here think you have no need of them? Are your friendships only with people who are like you? Are you building up or tearing down with your speech?*

D. The Church is God's family (Mark 3:32-35, John 19:26)

... For whoever does the will of God, he is My brother and sister and mother. Mark 3:32-35

Am I practicing good works? (Isa. 1:17; Rom. 12; James 1:27)

... having a reputation for good works ... shown hospitality to strangers ... assisted those in distress ... devoted herself to every good work. 1 Tim. 5:9-10

Troubleshooting:

• How do I even start reaching out?

Come early, stay late. Don't be a pew warmer. Get out of your comfort zone. Learn names. Use every tool at your disposal: Prayer sheet, social media, mutual ministry.

• What about weddings, showers, sickness, funerals?

And if one member suffers, all the members suffer with it; if one member is honored, all the members rejoice with it. 1 Cor. 12:26

Reflect: *Don't be afraid to invest in families. Do you have friendships outside your own status / gender group? Ask someone outside your group to pray with you. Be transparent and listen. Build a bridge. Adopt a family. Adopt an older friend. Practice good works. Bring a friend along!*

God's Heart Reflected

Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children; and walk in love, just as Christ also loved you . . . Eph. 5:1-2

A. God is compassionate. He moves toward us.

(Titus 3:3-5; Eph. 2:1-7)

For thus says the Lord GOD, "Behold, I Myself will search for My sheep and seek them out." Ezek. 34:11

Reflect: *Are you moving towards people in their messiness? Even if they reject you or fail you? Aren't you glad God moves toward us?!*

B. God is gentle with us

Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Matt. 11:29

. . . Your gentleness makes me great. Psalm 18:35

*So, as those who have been **chosen of God, holy and beloved** put on a heart of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience; bearing with one another, and forgiving each other, whoever has a complaint against anyone; just as the Lord forgave you . . . Col. 3:12-13*

Reflect: *Are you gentle on others? Does your gentleness embolden them in their walk with Christ?*

C. God does not show partiality (Acts 10:34-35; Rom. 12:16)

At the judgment, Jesus will treat ministry to “*even of the least*” of our brothers as ministry to Himself. Matt. 25:40

If, however, you are fulfilling the royal law according to the Scripture, “You shall love your neighbor as yourself,” you are doing well. But if you show partiality, you are committing sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. James 2:1-9

Reflect: *Who are your friends at church? Are you seeking position or power? Do your relationships point to Christ?*


