## Historic Churches of the Scottish Borders

### Simprim:

The earliest known church on this site may have been built by Hye (Hugh) de Symprine during the reign of King David I (1124 to 1153). The income from the church went to Thor, who is likely to have been the parish priest, but who was also Archdeacon of Lothian.

As an act of devotion, Hye de Symprine gave "a toft (farmstead), a croft (cottage) and eighteen acres of land" to Kelso Abbey. Archdeacon Thor continued to receive the income from the church until the end of his life, after which the income tog became the property of Kelso Abbey.

The church was dedicated on 25th June 1247 by Bishop David de Bernham who in 1251, allowed the monks to use the income from Simprim to provide rene the poor and hospitality for travellers. This could mean that the money was not spent in Simprim, which was a tiny parish, but at Kelso Abbey itself.

In July 1482 the church was burnt on the orders of Richard, Duke of Gloucester (later King Richard III of England). It was subsequently repaired, but its fortunes declined and following the Reformation of 1560 it was left without church officers for some years. A revival was achieved, however, and between 1699 and 1701, the minister was Thomas Boston. Boston was a theologian much influenced by the Cameronian tradition popular in 17th century Ayrshire. In 1720 he published the "Fourfold State of Man", which contributed to the First Secession (split) in the Church of Scotland.

In 1756 a new bell and steeple (with weather sock) were added to the church but in 1761 the parish was united with Swinton, the church closed, and the bell was removed to Swinton-House. In 1899 the window in the surviving east gable was blocked up and a plaque inserted in commemoration of Thomas Boston's association with the church.



#### THE PARISH OF ETTRICK

A vast tract of Ettrick Forest was conveyed to the monks of Melrose Abbey by King Alexander II in 1235, taking in Cappercleuch, Tushielaw and the lands of the Tema and the Rankleburn. This was granted as free forest, no tree cutting or hunting without the permission of the Church, and all wool sold was free of export duty. Even though thes that this was a time of prosperity when the Forest remained fairly intact and when farming did well. There was also a considerable

In the mid 16th century, after the Reformation, the New Kirk at Ettrick was established. Seemingly there was dearth of eligible ministers and it was a long time before the Valleys enjoyed the services of a preacher of the Reformed Faith. No doubt at that time eople here all fell into lawless ways, both spiritually and politically.

The early years of the 18th century were a time of harsh religious discipline and matching harsh punishments. The Kirk was overseer not only of the spirit but also of law and order and it was the role of church elders to keep a watch on the parishioners and punish ose failing to observe the rules of the Sabbath.

It is one of the fastest flowing rivers in Scotland, second only to the Spey. The source rises at Capel Fell, approximately 678 meters above sea level, and runs for 28 miles to its confluence with the tweed at Sunderland Hall, 100 meters above sea level.



#### JAMES HOGG (1770-1835)

He was born just 200 or so metres from here in a cottage at Ettrickhouse Farm. The cottage no longer stands but the spot is marked. As a young man he worked locally as a shepherd and farmhand, and was largely self-educated through reading, he was a l'friend of many of the great vietror of his day, including Sir Valer Scott, when he later word an insuntherized biography of . He became widely known as the CUTIKK Stepherd\*, a dickname under which some of his works were published. He

In 1810 Hogg moved to Edinburgh and subsequently made his reputation as a poet with his collection The Queen's Wake published in 1815. In 1815 the Duke of Buccieoch died and bequeathed Hogg a farm at Altrive Lake in Yarrow. He lived here until the end of his life, farming and writing.

#### **THOMAS BOSTON (1676-1732)**

He lived in Pothurn, at the head of this valley, from 1965 to 1970.






