


THE PRISON ON BEDFORD BRIDGE. (From an Old Print.)




Answer: Forgetful Green






From their ascent to the place where Christian first caught sight of Faithful, to Gaius making them a feast before their departure from his house


All our fretting and worrying is caused by calculating with God (Oswald Chambers).



From the Lord's showing them by what Deed they were saved, to their leaving Interpreter's house.







