

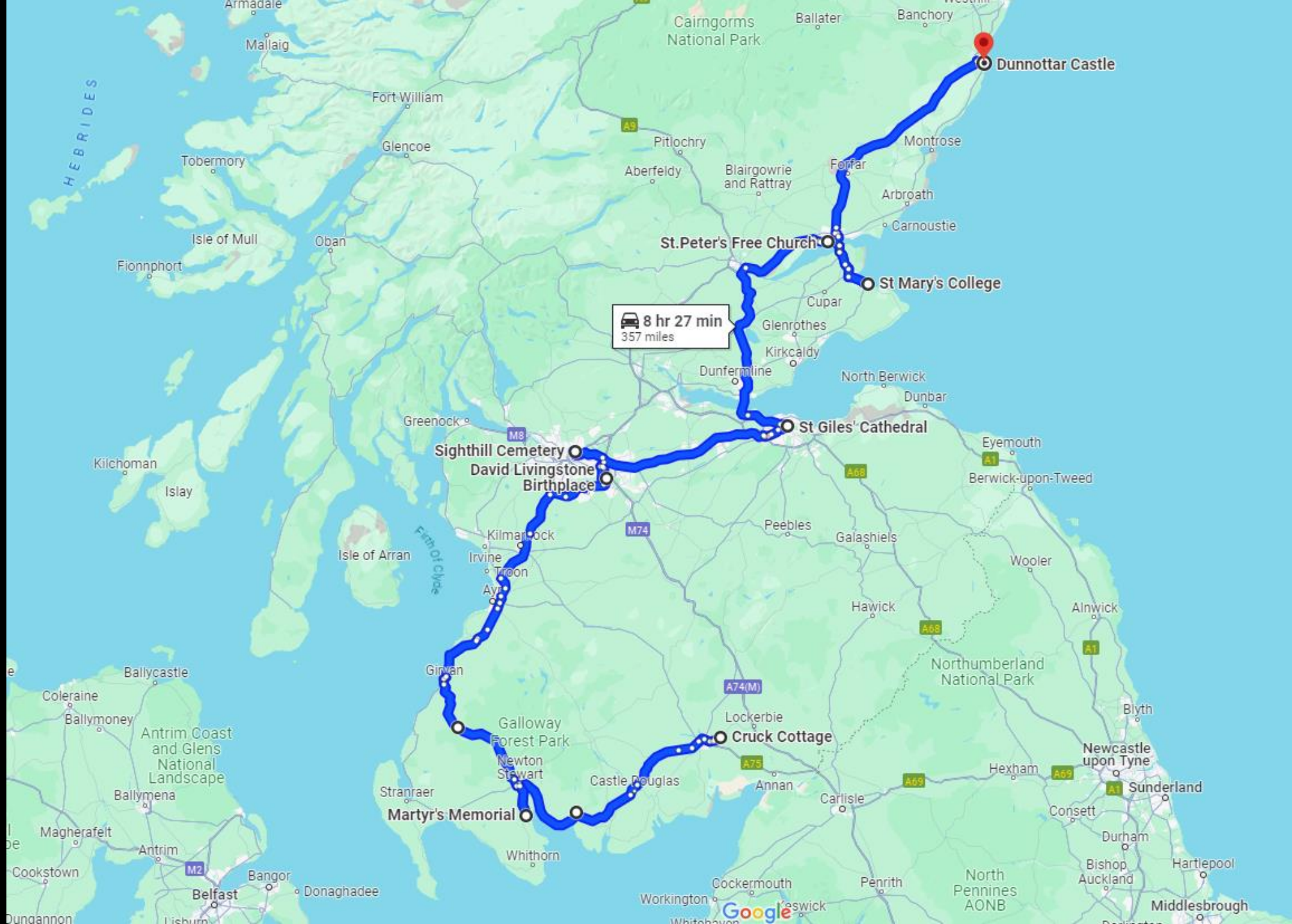


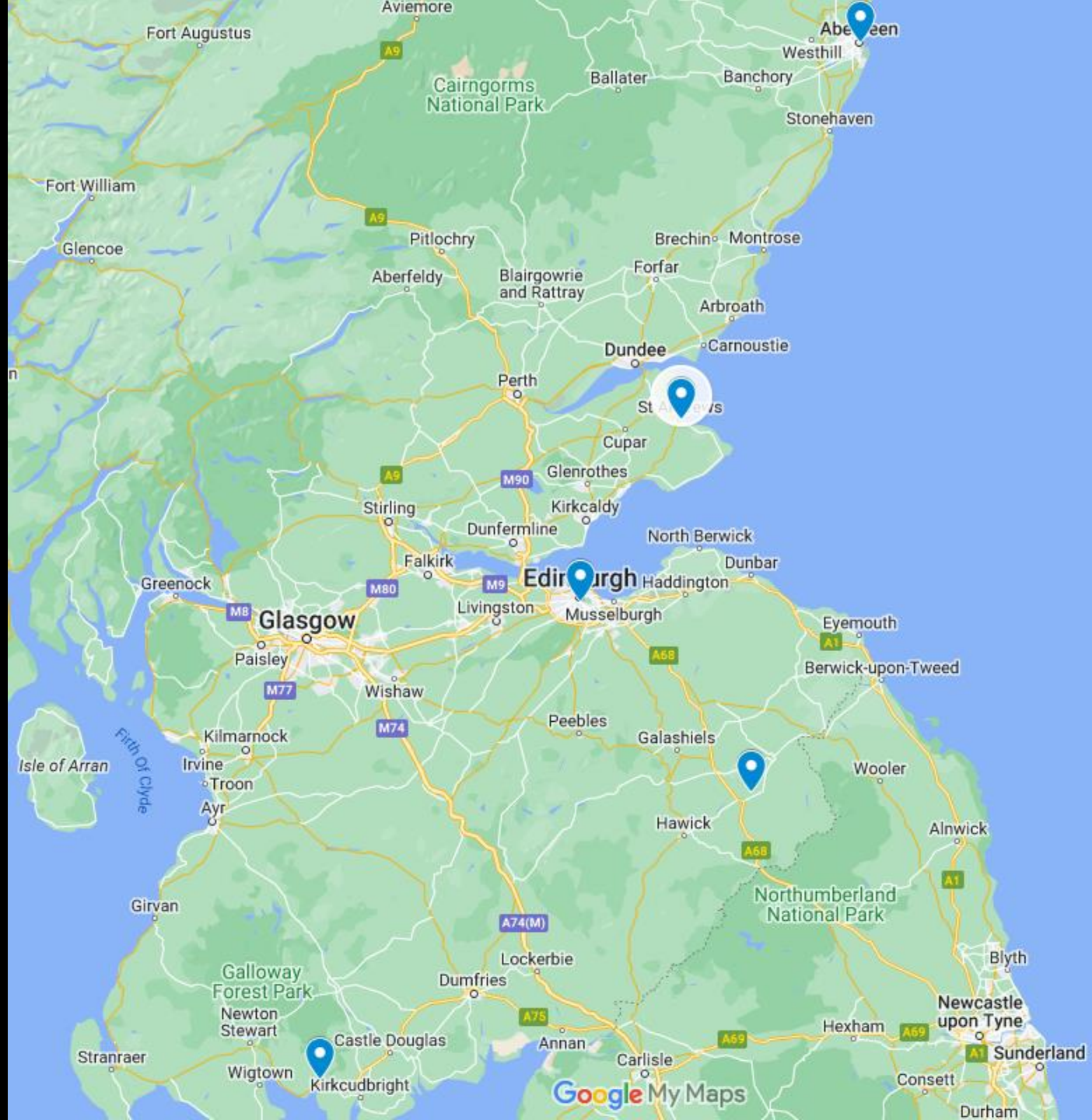

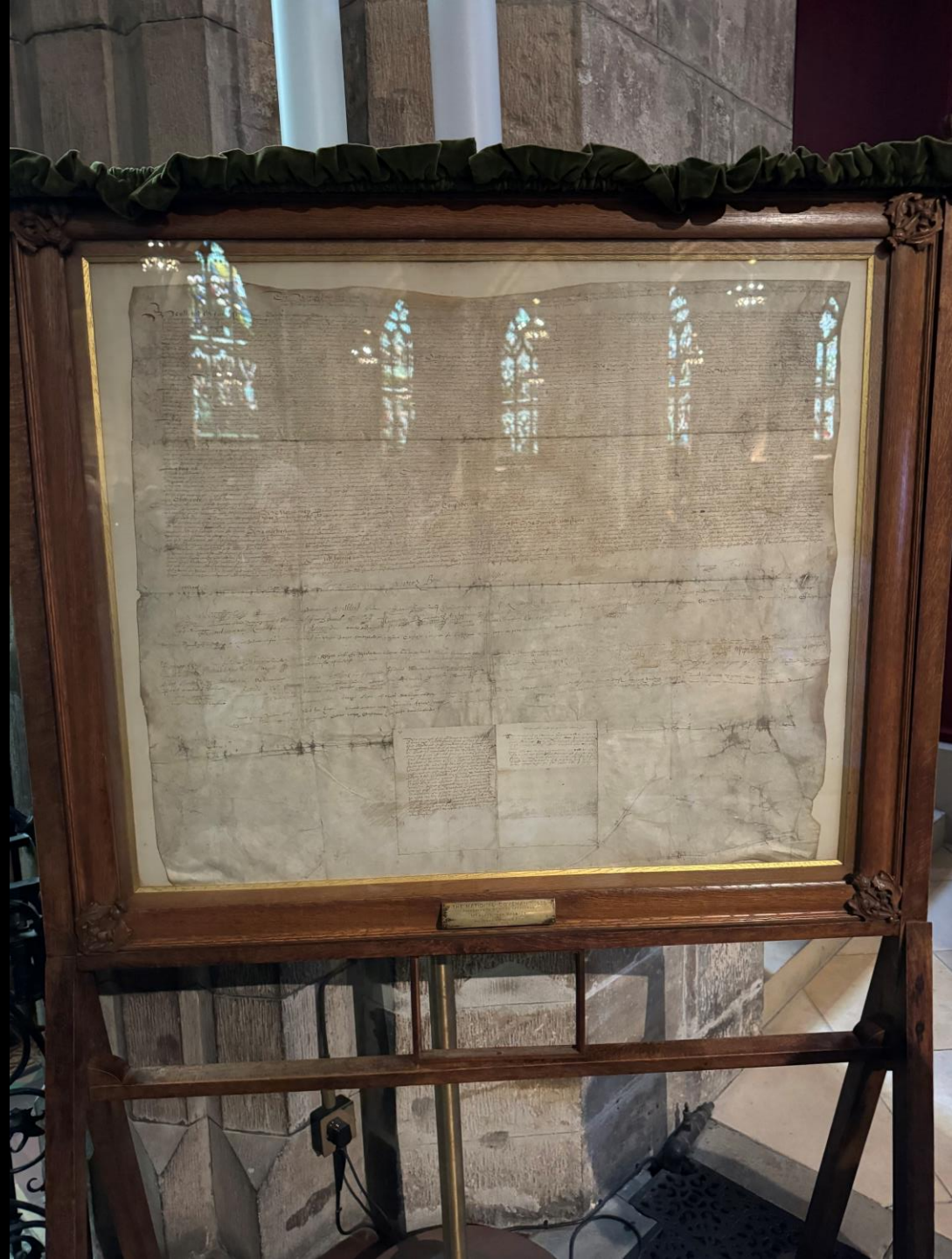








“Dinna say Mass

From May 27th 1661 that the most noble Marquis
of Argyll was beheaded, to the 17th of Febr 1688

Eighteen thousand of whom were execut'd at Edinburgh about an
hundred of Noblemen, Gentlemen, Ministers and Others, noble
Martyrs for JESUS CHRIST. The most of them are
buried in the Church of Writches, Crossstanes and Deacons Halls.

Dunnottar Castle is a dramatic and evocative ruined fortress located in a truly stunning cliff top setting.

As you wander around the extensive buildings you will discover an impressive castle that holds many rich secrets of Scotland's colourful past, helping to bring history alive.

The Castle was the home of the Earl Marischal, once one of the most powerful families in the land.

William Wallace, Mary Queen of Scots, the Marquis of Montrose and the future King Charles II all graced the castle with their presence.

More famously, it was at Dunnottar Castle where a small garrison held out against the might of Oliver Cromwell's army for eight months and saved the Scottish Crown Jewels, the 'Heimous of Scotland', from destruction.

A darker chapter in the history of Dunnottar is the gruesome story of the imprisonment of 607 Covenanters in the 'Wig's Vault' in 1685 following their refusal to acknowledge the King's supremacy in spiritual matters.

The last Earl Marischal was convicted of treason for his part in the Jacobite rising of 1715 and as a result his estates, including the Castle, were seized by the Government.

The buildings were much neglected until 1925, when the 1st Viscountess Cowdray embarked on a systematic repair of the Castle and it was officially opened to visitors thereafter, steadily becoming one of Scotland's most-visited tourist attractions.



Please take care when walking around the Castle as there are steep, steep steps and uneven floors - an unevenness that outside footwear is likely to catch on.

For your safety please do not venture off paths and areas of uneven ground.

Dunnottar Castle is a Scheduled Ancient Monument and we ask that you help us to continue to preserve it for use climbing on the buildings and walls.

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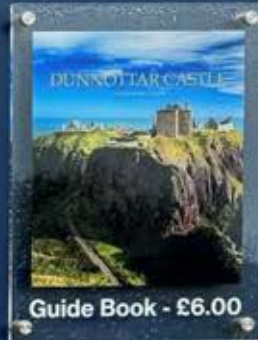

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
