- 1. Open in Prayer and read Philemon verses 1 3.
- 2. In the past, how have you handled it when someone has wronged you?
  - a. Did you confront them? How did that go?
  - b. How would you recommend someone do that so that it results in a good and peaceful outcome?
- 3. In the past, how have you handled it when you have wronged someone?
  - a. Did you act to make it right? How or what did you do?
  - b. How would you recommend someone else to "make it right" so that it leads to a good and peaceful outcome?
- 4. Why do we normally just avoid dealing with our wronging and being wronged?
  - a. What are the results of this avoidance?
- 5. Why does Paul call himself a prisoner of Christ when he is clearly a prisoner of Rome?
  - a. Why do we struggle to see how God is involved in our difficult situations?
  - b. How is he involved in our difficult situations?
- 6. What stops wealthier people from following the example of Philemon and his family by providing in special ways for the ministry of the local church? (they met in his home)



- a. How can those who have more in our day show special care for the ministry of our local church?
- 7. Are you uncomfortable with the fact that the Scriptures describe great people of the faith (like Abraham) owning slaves?
  - a. Why or why not?
  - b. Do you understand why skeptics and critics of Christianity call the Bible immoral because it describes slavery in places without explicitly condemning it?
- 8. The Bible was used by both abolitionists and slave-owners over the centuries to justify their views.
  - a. Who was right?
  - b. Which does the Bible support?
  - c. How does it support them?
- 9. How would you answer the critique made by many modern critics of Christianity that the Bible is "pro-slavery"?
