Date, author and historical background

Acts is part of a two-volume work, with the Gospel of Luke being the first volume. Neither book names its author, but Luke is clearly the author of both. External evidence (i.e., church tradition from mid-second century AD support Luke as the author) and internal evidence (i.e., Luke refers to himself in the 'we' sections of Acts (Acts 16:10-17; 20:5-21; 27:1ff; 28:16) and is mentioned by in several of his letters as his companion (Col 4:14; 2 Tim 4:11; Phil 24), support Luke as the author.

Luke was gentile from Antioch and a medical doctor. He was not an eyewitness of Jesus' ministry, but an early convert and second-generation member of the early church. He accompanied Paul on his 2nd and 3rd missionary journeys.

Scholars date Acts as early as 62AD, a guess based primarily on the abrupt conclusion of the book where Paul is in Rome under house arrest awaiting his trial before Caesar (Acts 28:30).

How are we to read and apply ACTS today?

How are we to use Luke's historical account of the church's expansion in Acts to 'do' church in the twenty-first century? Is it valid to take the descriptions of events back then and simply implement them in the church today? This seems to be the way many in the church apply the book of Acts today, and the reason we have such diversity of opinion on the practices to be adopted by the church.

The critical question is, 'What was Luke's intention when he wrote the book of Acts?' It was not primarily to describe the history of the early church in detail. Only one line of church expansion is described (from Jerusalem to Rome). Nor was it to give clear descriptions of exactly how things happened (i.e., how people were baptised or how the church was organised). The detail is just not there. Yet, Luke's intention is to show how the church expanded and leave this for us as a model for us to follow. As Gordon Fee puts it in the article *Acts- the Problem of Historical Precedent*, "*...he (Luke) was trying to show how the church emerged as a chiefly Gentile, worldwide phenomenon from its origins as a Jerusalem-based Judaism-oriented sect of Jewish believers, and how the Holy Spirit was directly responsible for this phenomenon of universal salvation based on grace alone. The recurring motif that nothing can hinder this forward movement of the church empowered by the Holy Spirit makes us think that Luke also intended his readers to see this as a model for their existence. And the fact that Acts is in the canon further makes us think that surely this is the way the church was intended to be – evangelistic, joyful, empowered by the Holy Spirit.*"

If it is Luke's intention to give us a model, then how can we then apply the model presented in Acts to the church today? Firstly, we need to identify the principles the Luke's intends to teach us in Acts (ie., the expansion of the church is Holy Spirit empowered and so prayer is an important church activity). The article by Gene Getz, *A Look through three Lenses*" is helpful in distinguishing function from form as we read the Bible. He makes the point of page 38, "*the Bible often teaches function without describing form. Where it does describe form, it is partial and incomplete. What form is described varies from situation to situation ... it is not possible to absolutize something that is not described; that is always incomplete; and that is always changing from one setting to another ... On the other hand, functions and principles are absolute – if they appear consistently throughout New Testament history and are not self-delimiting.*" In other words, the functions are normative – we must baptise people, appoint elders, pray and teach the Word etc, but exactly how we go about this is not normative. The only caveat to this is that we also consider the rest of Scripture. It may be that in another part of Scripture a particular practice is taught as normative for the church.

What does this mean for the actual practices of the church? Can we simply ignore the detail in Acts. Fee suggests on page 101 that "*biblical precedents may sometimes be regarded as repeatable patterns – even if they are not to be regarded as normative.*" This is especially the case if we find it repeated in the New Testament. For example, preaching in monologue form is a repeated pattern in Acts although not exclusively. Therefore, it is valid for that form to be repeated today.

We, therefore, have freedom to determine the form of a particular function where the Scripture does not prescribe a specific detail of practice. To determine how exactly to implement the biblical principles laid down in Acts in the church today, we need to take into considerations: (1) practice in history and (2) the cultural norms of the day.

Acts 1 / You will be my witnesses

UNDERSTANDING GOD'S WORD (*Goals: See what God is saying to us in this week's passage*)

Read Acts 1:1-26

1. Luke writes in Acts 1:1, “in my former book (the gospel of Luke) I wrote about all that Jesus began to do and to teach.” What does this imply about the content of Acts?
2. In verse 2-5 we’re told Jesus taught the disciples about the Kingdom of God and charged them to stay in Jerusalem until they were baptised by the Holy Spirit. Why do the disciples ask the question about restoring the Kingdom to Israel in verse 6?
3. How does Jesus’ response in verses 7-8 challenge expand the disciples thinking and understanding of the gospel?
4. Verses 3-11 tell us that Jesus, who suffered and died, appeared to the disciples over a 40-day period, instructed them in the things of Kingdom of God, promised them the gift of the Holy Spirit, commissioned them to be his witnesses, and would one day return. What does this tell us about His place and role in the church today?
5. Read Psalm 55:12-15; 69:25 & 109:8. (Note: Psalms 69 & 109 are quoted by Peter in vs 20.) Together these Psalms speak of the betrayal, removal from office and replacement of Judas. Why was it important that Judas be replaced?

APPLYING GOD'S WORD (*Goals: Turn understanding into discipleship, make real resolutions on which you can take action*)

6. The Apostles thought of the Kingdom of God as territorial, national, and immediate. Why was this wrong? In what way might our thinking be distorted by these same ideas about the Kingdom of God?

7. What does Luke tell us in verse 14 about the way the believers prayed. To what extent do our praying with other Christians (e.g., our GG prayer times & quarterly prayer meetings) reflect these priorities?

8. Where is Jesus now and what is he doing? What does this mean for our church?

9. The Apostles had a unique role in establishing the church and recording the New Testament Scriptures. In what way is Jesus commission to his disciples also meant for us? Discuss what that means in practice for us.

10. Discuss practical actions (*option to do in pairs and/or triplets*)
 - a. Discuss one way you will personally put what you have learnt into practice

 - b. Who will you tell this week about what you've learned?

Acts 2:1-39 / Pentecost

UNDERSTANDING GOD'S WORD (*Goals: See what God is saying to us in this week's passage*)

Read Acts 2:1-39

1. What is the significance of the appearance of the Spirit (v 2-4) as a mighty wind and fire? See Exodus 13; Ezekiel 1
2. In verses 5-13 the disciples speak in tongues (Luke makes it clear these were real languages which could be understood). This did not depend on their learning or their eloquence, but it was a work of God's Spirit. What was the purpose of the miracle of languages?
3. Peter in his sermon explains the miracle of the languages (vs 21). He quotes the prophet Joel 2:28-32. What parts of the Joel prophecy was fulfilled in Acts 2 and which parts are yet to be fulfilled?
4. Verse 23 tells us that God is sovereign and that no evil can change his plan. In fact, he uses what was intended for evil for his redemption plan. Where else in Scripture do we see a clear view of God's sovereignty over world events and human responsibility for evil? Discuss Sovereignty of God and human responsibility.
5. In verses 23-36, Peter provides a summary of the gospel supported by OT quotes from Psalm 16:8-11 & Psalm 110:1 which talk about Jesus' resurrection and exaltation. What is Peter's summary of the gospel?
6. Why did the crowd's respond to Peter's gospel message and what does Peter tell them to do (vs 37-41)?

APPLYING GOD'S WORD (*Goals: Turn understanding into discipleship, make real resolutions on which you can take action*)

7. When have you been convicted of your sin by the Spirit of God, so that you were cut to the heart and repented and turned to Christ for the forgiveness of your sin?
8. The focus of the church's witness (& our own witness as God's people) is the proclamation of the good news of Jesus who is Lord and Messiah. What are the things that hinder us from being effective witnesses in our day and culture?
9. How can we encourage each other and how can the church help us be more effective witnesses? Think of practical things that might help?

5. How is Stephen's speech a masterful, Holy Spirit inspired presentation of the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ? How is Stephen's death full of Christ reflecting his master's death?

APPLYING GOD'S WORD (*Goals: Turn understanding into discipleship, make real resolutions on which you can take action*)

6. Church traditions and buildings cannot contain the Living God. Why is there a tendency for us to become 'religious' when we focus on these things rather than God's presence with us in Christ? How can we avoid this?

7. God is everywhere present. Is God a presence in your life like he was for Stephen? How can we enjoy God's presence and power in our lives? Discuss

8. What is your reaction to the death of Stephen? In what way is he a good example for us?

9. Persecution often strengthens the church. Stephen was martyred, and the church was scattered, Saul was converted, and the number of converts multiplied as the gospel spread beyond Jerusalem (Acts 1:8). How does this chapter prepare you to stand firm in the faith?

10. Discuss practical actions (*option to do in pairs and/or triplets*)
 1. Discuss one way you will personally put what you have learnt into practice
