

Matthew 18-20 | Background

From his genealogy and childhood (ch.1-2), to John's role (ch.3), Matthew has clearly shown that Jesus fulfilled Old Testament prophecies as God's anointed (Gk. 'Christ' Heb. 'Messiah'). God's twin declarations 'This is my Son' (baptism ch.3 & transfiguration ch.17), accompanied by his miracles (eg. 8:14-17, 11:1-6, 12:15-21), leave us in no doubt that Jesus is the one all scripture has been waiting for.

Jesus has shown that the purpose of his ministry is to forgive sinners (9:1–13). The centre of Jesus' message mirrors John's word for word; 'Repent, for the Kingdom of God has come near' (3:2, 4:17, 10:7).

The Pharisees, having their hypocrisy exposed, have accused him of being possessed by Satan (9:34, 12:22-24), and are already plotting to kill him (12:1-14). Twice when pushed for a sign (as if they don't already have enough!) Jesus says that the only sign that generation would get is the sign of Jonah 3 days in the earth (12:38-41, 16:1-4).

After Peter's declaration that Jesus is 'The Christ, the Son of the living God.' (16:16), Jesus began to explain that he 'must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things by the hands of the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and on the third day be raised to life' (16:21).

Matthew 18-20 | Big Picture

This section begins with Jesus continuing his ministry in Galilee and ends with Jesus beginning his journey towards his death in Jerusalem. It is dominated by a number of questions asked and comments made to Jesus¹, which fall into two categories: What do I have to give, and what do I get. In other words, how much will the Kingdom cost me, and, what's in it for me? These questions and comments from Pharisees, strangers and disciples show that none have truly grasped the nature of the Kingdom.

In this section, Jesus shows that the Kingdom is upside-down to what they are expecting. This is the Kingdom where those who put themselves first, will be last, and those who put themselves last, will be first (19:30, 20:16 & 20:26). Unlike every other kingdom on earth, God's Kingdom isn't about comfortable glory, victory and ruling in this life; but a life of suffering, humility and service. Whatever we seek in this life, we will receive the opposite in the next. As we shall see, this applies to dealing with sin, marriage, singleness, age, wealth, work, suffering and church leadership. These realities of life in the Kingdom are just as confronting and jarring for us today as for Jesus' disciples back then.

As we search these scriptures this term, our goal is to lead ourselves and our groups in letting these scriptures search our hearts and reach into some of the deepest and most firmly lodged values and hardest areas of our lives. Let us do this with much humility, prayer, gentleness and persistent love.

WEEK 3 | UPSIDE-DOWN RELATIONSHIPS

Connecting

- · Find out who in your group has lived in the most houses.
- From this past week, share one thing to thank God for and one thing to ask God for:

This week we're looking at how the Kingdom turns relationships upsidedown, particularly regarding how we relate to each other when someone sins. Jesus calls us to upside-down, costly, sacrificial love towards other Christians when they sin against us. Here we deal with two of the hardest things a human could ever do: firstly, call a brother or sister to repentance, and secondly, forgive a brother or sister after they have repeatedly hurt us. Only God's Spirit can turn our hearts upside-down to do this. We need to ask for his help to transform us.

Pray

- Thank God for each other.
- Pray about specific thanks and requests.
- Ask God to transform our minds and hearts as we read his word so that we will think, love and act as Kingdom people when confronted with other Christians' sins.

Listening & Applying

- 1. What would you do if you saw a Christian:

4. After Cain killed Abel, God asked him where his brother was. Cain
retorted, 'I don't know. Am I my brother's keeper?' (Gen. 4:9). The
unspoken correct answer is, 'Yes! Of course you are!'. Do Jesus' words
in v15-18 expose any Cain-likeness in your attitudes toward your
Christian brothers and sisters?

5. Why do you think Jesus felt we needed clear instructions on what to do about sin in the church?

6. How has the goal of 'winning them over' (v15) shaped each step of the process Jesus gave us for dealing with sin?

Verses 18-20 echo 16:19 where Jesus told Peter that people would be bound or loosed as a result of the proclamation of the gospel. As we proclaim the gospel and call brothers and sisters to repentance, they are either bound, or loosed, depending on whether or not they repent. But there is no point encouraging people to repent of their sin unless we are prepared to forgive them for it.

Read v21-35

7. What was wrong with Peter's question?

8. Can you testify to a time when remembering what Christ had forgiven you for enabled you to forgive someone else? (But don't dump anyone in it!)

9. Jesus' warning in v35 seems like us being forgiven is conditional on us being able to forgive others. How is this not a 'work' to earn our salvation?

Forgiveness is incredibly hard, especially when it's to the same person, for the same thing, again, or is a horribly hurtful wrong. It's only truly possible when our hearts have been transformed and softened by God's grace shown to us. We can't just force or will it in our own strength. But it is still a choice. We need to remind ourselves of God's grace to us and choose to let go of our anger, and love the person. This doesn't necessarily mean that everything goes back to how things were before the offence. We may well need to adapt how we relate to them and adjust the boundaries we keep in certain situations, but it does mean that we stop hating the person and keeping the offence as a weapon against them.

Responding

- **Share** any situation where you are struggling to forgive, or to help a believer deal with their sin, or with your own sin.
- Remind each other how serious sin is and how much Jesus has forgiven you.
- **Gently encourage** each other to be courageous in love.
- **Pray** that God will turn your heart upside-down to love, win-over, and forgive.
- Commit to pray for and support each other in this challenging task.

WEEK 4 | UPSIDE-DOWN MARRIAGE

Connecting

- Share the best party (your own) you've ever had.
- From this past week, share one thing to thank God for and one thing to ask God for:

 How has God been working in your heart and life during the past week regarding forgiveness and lovingly attempting to win others out of deadly sin?

Last week we saw how the Kingdom turns our thinking on relationships upside-down when it comes to other people's sin. Today, we stay in the nitty-gritty of life as the Kingdom upends our thinking on marriage, divorce, and being single.

Pray

- Thank God for each other.
- · Pray about specific thanks and requests.
- Ask God to transform our minds and hearts as we read his word so that we will think and act as Kingdom people regarding marriage, divorce and singleness.

Listening & Applying

Jesus has so far been ministering around Galilee. He now begins to make his way toward Jerusalem. He has already told his disciples that, "He must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things at the hands of the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and on the third day be raised from the dead" (16:21, 17:22-23).

Read Matthew 19:1-3

2. What are some common reasons for divorce nowadays?

3. What do each of Jesus' statements tell us about marriage?

Australian evangelist John Chapman once wrote; 'Everyone starts by being single. Some people remain single, and at least half of the married will end by being single again when their spouses die.'

11. How can we as God's people love, honour and encourage our single brothers and sisters, no matter what situation we are in?

² Eunuchs were men who were unable to have sexual relations with women because they did not have functioning genitalia: either due to birth defect ('born that way') or by deliberate castration ('made eunuchs by others'). The latter were usually slaves who were castrated early in life to serve a particular function for a ruler (eg. guard and administrate the king's harem). Jesus introduces a third group of self-made, virtual-eunuchs ('who choose to live like eunuchs') who choose to remain unmarried.

Responding

- Share where you are struggling to love Jesus' teaching about marriage, divorce and singleness and would like prayer.
- Remind each other that God has something better planned for us.
- Gently encourage each other to live for the Kingdom in whatever situation we are in.
- Pray that God will turn your heart upside-down to think his thoughts on marriage, divorce and singleness and honour him in every situation.
- Commit to pray for and support each other.

WEEK 5 | UPSIDE-DOWN VALUES

Connecting

- Can you remember ever being told off by a stranger when you were a child? What was it for?
- From this past week, share one thing to thank God for and one thing to ask God for:

 How has God been bringing about change in the past week regarding your thoughts and attitudes about marriage, divorce and singleness?

Just like the last three weeks, this part of Matthew's gospel centres around questions people asked Jesus. As before, Jesus gets right to the heart of the matter, this time showing how the Kingdom turns values upside-down.

Pray

- Thank God for each other.
- Pray about specific thanks and requests.
- Ask God to transform our minds and hearts as we read his word so that we will think and act as Kingdom people regarding our values.

Listening & Applying

- **3** "You shall **not misuse the name of the LORD your God,** for the LORD will not hold anyone guiltless who misuses his name.
- 4 "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is a sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, neither you, nor your son or daughter, nor your male or female servant, nor your animals, nor any foreigner residing in your towns. For in six days the LORD made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but he rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy.
- **5 "Honor your father and your mother,** so that you may live long in the land the LORD your God is giving you.
- 6 "You shall not murder.
- 7 "You shall not commit adultery.
- 8 "You shall not steal.
- **9** "You shall **not give false testimony** against your neighbor.
- **10** "You shall not covet your neighbour's house. You shall **not covet** your neighbour's wife, or his male or female servant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbour."

- **Gently encourage** each other that the Kingdom is infinitely more valuable than earthly riches and that Jesus cares for our every need.
- **Pray** that God will turn your heart upside-down to be like children who rely on their father for everything.
- Commit to pray for and support each other.

WEEK 6 | UPSIDE-DOWN REWARDS

Connecting

- Can you think of a time you were dudded of something you deserved / someone didn't give you what you were rightfully owed?
- From this past week, share one thing to thank God for and one thing to ask God for:

 How has God been working in your heart and life in the past week to help you rely not on earthly possessions or personal goodness, but on Jesus?

Where we finished last week, Peter wanted assurance that he would be rightly rewarded in the Kingdom for everything he sacrificed in this life. Jesus concluded by explaining that in the upside-down Kingdom, noone who gives up now for Jesus will miss out on their reward when everything is renewed, because, 'many who are first will be last, and many who are last will be first.' (19:30). But Jesus continues to explain that these rewards probably won't happen in the way that we naturally expect they will.

Pray

- · Thank God for each other.
- · Pray about specific thanks and requests.
- Ask God to transform our minds and hearts as we read his word so that we will think and act as Kingdom people regarding serving Jesus and heavenly rewards.

Listening & Applying

7.	How does this parable help us understand the kind of discipleship Jesus has called us to?
8.	Sometimes we can feel bitter and grumble about how much God expects of us. What do we need to recognise to see that God is not being unfair or ungenerous to us, and to gladly bear the burden?

- Gently encourage each other that building Christ's church is glorious and eternal.
- **Pray** that God will turn your heart upside-down to be grateful and glad to serve him.
- Commit to pray for and support each other.

WEEK 7 | UPSIDE-DOWN GREATNESS

Connecting

- What was your greatest childhood achievement?
- From this past week, share one thing to thank God for and one thing to ask God for:

 How has God been working in your heart and life in the past week to help you value the work Christ has given us and the generosity of God?

This week, the king is on his way to the capital. The disciples sense something big is about to happen. Finally, the moment for greatness! But in the Kingdom, greatness is turned upside-down.

Pray

- Thank God for each other.
- Pray about specific thanks and requests.
- Ask God to transform our minds and hearts as we read his word so that we will have a Kingdom view of greatness.

Listening & Applying

3. What does it mean that the other disciples were 'indignant'? Why do you think they responded like this?

5. What might James and John have thought Jesus was asking them in v22? What did Jesus really mean? What did he mean when he said that the disciples would also drink that cup?

- **Gently encourage** each other to imitate our King.
- Pray that God will enable you to view humility as true greatness.
