

# OVPRVIEW

### **Author & Date**

We don't have any personal information about the man Joel, other than the fact that he was the son of Pethuel and wrote to the elders living in the promised land in Judah.

The date of Joel, as with many of The Prophets, is contested. Some scholars argue that it was written after the exile to Babylon, looking backwards. Others argue that it was written before the exile, as it draws near. These studies were written on the basis that it is set during an invasion of Jerusalem and Judah, which would place it either during the Assyrian invasion of 701 BC, the first Babylonian invasion of 598 BC, or the second Babylonian invasion of 588 BC. However, the exact dating isn't critical to our understanding of the book itself.

#### **Themes**

### The Day of the LORD

Joel addresses the distress of Israel under attack by her enemies in Joel's day. This is a contemporary day of judgement for Israel (ie. 'day of the LORD' 1:15). That 'day of the LORD' (**now**) was a pointer to the ultimate 'day of the LORD' (**then**, ch3) which Joel warns is coming. Following this "**now** > **then**" theme, Joel calls the people to lament their present circumstances and turn to the LORD for help. Joel then turns to God's divine answer and the ultimate day of judgement and deliverance that is coming when the wicked will be harvested and God's people established in safety forever.

#### **Pestilence**

Joel describes Judah's plight in many ways: locust plague (1:4), invading nation (1:6), temple worship disrupted (1:9), drought (1:10), famine (1:16) and fire (1:19). It is possible that all these things happened in quick succession, but likely that Joel is using poetic language to describe a disastrous event in such a way that it has universal application in times of disaster for God's people.

### Repentance

In light of God's day(s) of judgement, Joel calls God's people to return to the LORD.

# God's Sovereignty & Goodness

Yahweh has absolute authority over all nations and peoples on earth. All of history is under God's control. All people will be brought under God's final judgement.

#### God's Faithfulness to His Covenant

God is always faithful to the covenant he made with his people. He will rescue his people and establish them in his place under his rule and blessing.

# The Coming of the Spirit in Salvation

Joel prophesies the pouring out of God's Spirit on all people, bringing salvation to all who call on the name of the LORD before the final day of the LORD.

# **Structure**

Joel is centred around two 'days of the LORD': a present day of the LORD in Joels' day and the final day of the LORD at the end of world history. Joel moves from the now (Joel's day of the LORD) —to the time in between Joel's day and the final day—to the final day of the LORD.

#### Joel moves from:

- 1: A call to mourning in a time of pestilence and judgement (a day of the LORD in Joel's day)
- 2:1-12: Joel reminds his contemporaries that there is a future and final day of the LORD coming
- 2:13-17: Joel calls for Judah to repent and call on God's grace to deliver them from their present predicament
- 2:18-27: Joel records God's promise that in between he will respond to their cry for mercy by ending the current crisis and blessing his people:
- 2:28-32: This blessing will culminate in the pouring out of his Spirit on all people in between
- 3: Joel moves to the final day of the LORD where all people of the earth will be judged and God's people rescued and vindicated

# **Looking Up**

 What is a crisis you have lived through? (Not a personal crisis, but communally shared with the whole community/nation you lived in eg. fires, floods, war etc.)

Joel is an Old Testament book most likely written while the Babylonians were attacking Jerusalem (during either the first invasion of 598 BC or the second invasion of 588 BC). At this point in history, Israel has been split into two. The northern kingdom (Israel) has already been destroyed and scattered, and only the southern kingdom (Judah—where the capital, Jerusalem, is) remains (but they are about to be taken into exile). Joel begins with a national crisis that is happening at the time God spoke to Joel.
